John Bohannon was a son of William Bohannon (Buchanan) of Henry County, Virginia, who moved to White County, Tennessee, where he died in 1816,¹ by a first wife whose name has not been determined. Helen Cook was a daughter of William Cook, Jr. and Margaret Jones of Franklin County, Kentucky,² who moved there from Franklin County, Virginia, about 1785.

The "torn and faded" family record page from the Bible of William Bohannon contains a statement of the birth of John Bohannon:

John Bohannon was born April the 27, 17 ...

The year of birth for John Bohannon appears in the Bible of his son William Bohannon:³

William Bohannon born 1786, April 19th died Oct 3rd 1865
He was the son of John Bohannon born 1755

The relationship of John Bohannon of Shelby County, Kentucky, to William Bohannon of White County, Tennessee, is substantiated by a power of attorney filed by John Bohannon on 10 October 1829, after the death of William Bohannon:⁴

Know all men by these presents that I, John Bohannon, of the County of Shelby, and the State of Kentucky have made, nominated and appointed, and by these presents do make, nominate and appoint Henry Bohannon of the County and State aforesaid, my true and lawful attorney for me and in my name, and for my use and benefit, to ask, demand, sue for recover and receive, of and from the Executor, or Administrator (as the case may be) of William Bohannon, deceased who resided in the County of White and State of Tennessee, all such sum or sums of money, debts and demands whatsoever, which are now due and owing to me, the said John Bohannon, and by and from the said Executor or Administrator and to have use and take all lawful ways and means in my name or otherwise for the recovery thereof, by attachment, arrest, distress, or otherwise, and to compound, arbitrate, and agree for the same, and acquittances, or other sufficient discharges for the same. For me and in my name to make, seal, and deliver, and to do all lawful acts and things

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of James L. Whitaker, who is clerk of our said county court is in due form of law, and that said Whitaker was clerk at the time of granting said certificate and that full faith and credit is due and ought to be given to all his official acts as such.

Given under my hand as aforesaid this 19th day of October 1829.

Seth Cook and Bathsheba Dunn were a brother and sister of Helen Cook Bohannon. Henry Bohannon was the son of John Bohannon and Helen Cook.

On 27 October 1829 the attorney for John Bohannon and Abraham Bohannon conveyed their interest (2/18ths share) in the White County property of William Bohannon to the administrator of his estate, Thomas Barnes, who was married to Alice Bohannon, a half-sister of John Bohannon.⁵ Abraham Bohannon of Henry County, Kentucky, who assigned his power of attorney to Henry Bohannon in Shelby County for the same purpose and on the same day as John Bohannon, appears to be the only surviving child of Joshua Bohannon, a brother of John Bohannon, who was married to Rhoda Cook, sister of Helen Cook Bohannon. Joshua died before 16 October 1781, when Rhoda Cook Bohannon married John Jameson (Jamison) in Lincoln County, Virginia (Kentucky). There was no testimony in the records that described Abraham's relationship with William Bohannon.

John Bohannon and Helen Cook were married on 07 January 1774 in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, according to her application for a Revolutionary War widow's pension,⁶ but a record of it has not been found in Pittsylvania or the surrounding counties.

Pittsylvania County was established from Halifax County in 1766, which had been erected in 1752 from Lunenburg County. Bedford County was organized in 1753 from parts of Lunenburg and Albemarle counties. Henry County was created in 1776 from Pittsylvania County and Franklin County emerged from parts of Henry and Bedford counties in 1785.

John Bohannon (Bohannan), Joshua Bohannon (Bohannan) and William Dunn witnessed the will of William Cook of Bedford County, Virginia, on 04 March 1776. William Cook was the son of John Cook, whose relationship with William Cook, Jr., father of Helen Cook Bohannon, has not been determined. The will was proved in Henry County, Virginia, on 16 September 1777.⁷ William Dunn was the husband of Bathsheba Cook Dunn who affirmed that John Bohannon was the son of William Bohannon.

John Bohannon bought 50 acres of land on the Pigg River in Henry County, Virginia, from his father-in-law William Cook, for 40 pounds, on 20 April 1778, and sold it for 50 pounds to Robert Prunty on 22 July 1779.⁸ Pigg River originates in what is now Franklin County and flows eastward through Pittsylvania County into Roanoke (Staunton) River. The tract was described as lying on both sides of the river.⁹ The land on which William Cook resided was on the Pigg River at the mouth of Hatchet Run, which enters the river south of Rocky Mount, Virginia.¹⁰

In October 1779, a few months after selling their land in Virginia, John and Helen Cook Bohannon moved to Kentucky, where they settled at Wilson's Station.¹¹ Wilson's Station was established early in 1779 on a high ridge on the east bank of the Salt River, just below the mouth of Dry Branch, two and a half miles southwest of Harrodsburg in what is now Mercer County. A strong station, it was built by Henry Wilson whose brother John had been a member of the original Harrod Company of 1774. In

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the fall and winter of 1779, John May kept the surveyor's office for Kentucky County, Virginia, in Robert McAfee's cabin at Wilson's Station and also conducted a school there. Because of the surveyor's office and the nearness of the station to Harrodsburg, Wilson's was usually full of itinerant settlers and land speculators, who boarded there during the sessions of the land court or until they could build their own cabins. When John May opened the land office on 01 May 1780, to receive warrants issued by the land court, over 1,600,000 acres were registered. In order to process the paperwork of that one day's entries, May had to close the office on the following day, for a period of fifteen to twenty days, in order to complete the accounting.¹²

Dry Branch runs northward from Boyle County into Mercer County, parallel to Route 1915. It empties into Salt River just north of the intersection of Route 1915 and Route 598, not far from the historic Mud Meetinghouse,¹³ which was built about 1780 by a group of Huguenot settlers who came to Kentucky from Conemago Colony in York County, Pennsylvania.

John Bohannon and Alex Bohannon were listed as soldiers in Captain Benjamin Logan's Company in Lincoln County at or near Logan's Station on a roster probably made in 1779.¹⁴ However, Kentucky County was not divided by Virginia into Jefferson, Fayette and Lincoln counties until 1780.

John and Helen Bohannon lived at Wilson's Station from 1779 until 1781, where John served as a private soldier in the little garrison at the fort built at the station to protect the settlers. During the period, 1779-1783, John went on many scouting parties and tours of duty against the Indians. His military service included one six-week tour in Captain Ellison's Company under Colonel George Rogers Clark on the punitive expedition against Piqua (Pickaway) in the summer of 1780.¹⁵ Piqua was a principal town of the Shawnee Indians on Mad River, a branch of Big Miami River, in Ohio. Mad River rises near Bellefontaine and courses south past Springfield to join the Big Miami at Dayton.¹⁶ Colonel Clark organized two regiments under Colonel Benjamin Logan and Colonel William Linn, which contained about 1000 men. Participants from the area which became Louisville gathered at the Falls of the Ohio, while others collected at interior points. On 01 August they made a rendezvous at the confluence of the Licking and Ohio rivers, where Covington, Kentucky, now stands, across from Cincinnati, Ohio. Most of the contingent from the Falls of the Ohio, which brought artillery up the river, marched up the Kentucky side, but the company of Captain Hugh McGary moved up the Indiana shore for a while, where they were attacked by Indians and suffered some casualties. The army built a blockhouse to store supplies and house the wounded men, which was the first structure erected where Cincinnati is now located. With Simon Kenton leading the way as scout, the army moved north slowly, having to clear a roadway for their cannon. On 06 August they reached some deserted Indian villages which they burned, destroying the cabins, crops and orchards. They advanced up the Big Miami to Piqua, where the Indians, led by Simon Girty, were positioned to engage the Kentuckians. However, the defenders broke quickly in the face of artillery fire and fled. Clark's soldiers again laid waste to the Indian dwellings and crops.¹⁷

John Bohannon spent a month away from home once, when he went to Leestown (Lee's Town) to make canoes for use in public service. Situated one-half mile north of the site of Frankfort, Kentucky, Leestown is where the buffalo trace crossed the Kentucky River, between the grazing lands in central Kentucky, where Lexington eventually was built, to the salt lick known as Drennan's Lick in what became Henry County. However, since John did not serve for six consecutive months in a recognized military unit, Helen's application for a Revolutionary War widows' pension was denied.¹⁸

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In these early times on the frontier, every able-bodied man was a soldier by necessity. The settlers usually were actively engaged in war with the Indians from early spring until late fall of the year. The wilderness was studded with military posts from which war parties would attack the Indians almost as frequently as the Indians attacked the settlements. The hold of officers on their men was tenuous and maintained largely by popularity. Officers could advise but they did not command. Those who approved of the counsel would follow it. The only punishment for laziness or cowardice was public disfavor. In the small tight society of the frontier, the opinion of one's neighbors was a powerful inducement to conform and cooperate in matters of public service or safety. "Any man who failed to go and scout on campaigns when it came to his turn met with an expression of indignation in the countenances of all his neighbors and epithets of dishonor were fastened upon him without mercy."¹⁹

Helen Bohannon was 77 years old when she applied for a pension on 16 September 1833 in Shelby County. Her brother, Abraham Cook, the Baptist preacher, attested to her affidavit before her son, Justice of the Peace Henry Bohannon. She stated that John Bohannon died in Shelby County, Kentucky, on 10 July 1832, at the age of 77 which verifies his birth year as 1755.²⁰

Be it known that on this 16th day of September in the year 1833 personally appeared before Henry Bohannon a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County of Shelby and one of the Justices of the Shelby County Court Helen Bohannon widow and relict of John Bohannon deceased a resident of the said County aged 77 years who being duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following statement in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed 7th June 1832 - She states and deposes that she was married to John Bohannon deceased on the 7th day of January 1774 in the County of Pittsylvania in the State of Virginia, that in the fall of the year 1779 she and her said husband moved to Kentucky to that part of it now known as the County of Mercer that they immediately joined the little Garrison in the fort at Wilsons Station which had been erected to assist in the protection and defense of the frontier settlements, that her said husband remained in the said fort as a part of the Garrison thereof for two whole years except when he was absent therefrom on scouting parties and upon regular tours of duty several of which he performed during that period, that she also remained in the fort during the whole of said period, she states and declares that she distinctly recollects that her said husband performed a six week tour of duty as a private volunteer soldier in the Company of Capt John Ellison during which tour he went with Genl. Clarke upon the expedition against Piccaway which she thinks was in the year 1780 in the month of July of that year she thinks he entered the service upon his said tour, She further states that she distinctly remembers that he went on another tour of one month in the month of (blank) in the year 1781 to Lees Town where he was engaged as she understood from him & others in making canoes for the public service, that he was a volunteer soldier also upon this tour and served under Capt. (blank) as well as she remembers, She states also that she recollects distinctly of his again entering the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the month of April 1782 upon a tour of one month in the Company of Capt. (blank) and that he was marched to the widow Harbersons where he served out his tour by his substitute John (blank), She further states that she recollects of various other small tours which he performed under Capts. (blank) & (blank) but she cannot now state the number of them nor the points to which they were directed in consequence of her advanced age and consequent loss of memory but from her best recollections she is confident that he did not serve less than three tours of one month each by substitute over and above those particularly mentioned, that he served them as a private volunteer soldier and she is confident that the whole of

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his service upon regular tours of duty between the time of his entering the fort at Wilsons Station that being in the month of October in the year 1779 and the fall of the year 1783 did not amount to less than six months, She also states that during the said period from the month of Oct. 1779 up to the fall of the year 1783 he was engaged in a number of scouting parties against the Indians how many however and at what particular times she cannot say but from her present best recollection she states that he must have served not less during that period than three months in that way and during the balance of said period and whilst he was not engaged in active service upon regular tours of duty and scouting parties he was stationed in the fort and constituted a part of its Garrison, She states that the whole of his services rendered in the manner above named did not fall short of nine months on tours & scouts and according to her present best recollection they were all performed as a private

volunteer soldier, She states also that the whole of said services were performed against the Indians, She further states and declares that her said husband the said John Bohannon departed this life on the 10th day of July 1832 in Shelby County Ky. where he then resided that she has herself continued to reside and still resides in the same County and that by reason of her bodily infirmity she is unable to attend court to make her statement, She also states that the said John Bohannon was 77 years of age at the time of his death. Sworn to and subscribed the day and year first above named

And also at the same time and place personally appeared before the same Justice Abraham Cook a clergyman residing in Shelby County Ky. and Robert F. Gale residing in the same County and State who being duly sworn upon their oaths state that they are well acquainted with Helen Bohannon who has subscribed & sworn to the above statement, that she resides in Shelby County Ky. and is a person of respectability and that her statements are entitled to full faith and credit, they further state that she is the widow and relict John Bohannon of Shelby County Ky. who departed this life in the month of July 1832 in said County at an advanced age and who had the reputation in his neighbourhood of having been a soldier of the revolution which they verily believe and that they never heard the fact disputed or in the least doubted, they further state that they believe the said Helen Bohannon to be 77 years of age Sworn to and subscribed the day and year first aforesaid

Helen Cook Bohannon was 23 years old when she arrived in the Kentucky wilderness in 1779. The proportion of females on the frontier was small then, but it gradually grew and by 1781 young unmarried women began to migrate into Kentucky in substantial numbers. It has been reported that licenses to marry were the first processes issued by court clerks of the newly established counties. Lawsuits were practically unknown in the early days of the frontier. Disputes were probably settled on the spot, physically.

John and Helen Cook Bohannon apparently remained in Mercer County, after they left Wilsons Station in 1781, until 1789. They reportedly lived in Mercer County for ten years, before moving to Woodford County where they settled on Glens (Glenns) Creek in 1789. They spent their last years in Shelby County.²¹

John Bohannon was on the Woodford County tax list dated 21 April 1790.²² He had 150 acres on the Salt River in Mercer County entered, surveyed and granted in his name, which he conveyed to

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Joseph Edrington, the second husband of his sister, Betsy, prior to 19 July 1797, when Edrington was taxed for it as a resident of Woodford County. The land on which John Bohannon lived in Woodford County apparently did not belong to him since he was not assessed for land there:²³

The area of Lincoln County, Virginia, where Wilson's Station was located, became Mercer County in 1785.²⁴ Glenss Creek begins near Versailles in Woodford County and runs west into Franklin County, where it empties into the Kentucky River, just south of Frankfort. Route 1659 roughly follows Glenss Creek. Glenss Creek Church is at the intersection of 1659 and Steele Road, where the road and creek are in juxtaposition.²⁵

This chronology indicates that John Bohannon, Jr., with a birth year of 1785, was born in either Lincoln or Mercer counties and William Bohannon, with a birth year of 1786, was born in Mercer County, before Kentucky became a state in 1792. In the naming tradition of the time, however, it is likely that John Bohannon and Helen Cook would have named their first born son William for their fathers. Perhaps the traditional birth year of 1785 for John Bohannon, Jr.²⁶ is questionable. By the same naming tradition, they would have named their first daughter after his or her mother. Her mother was named Margaret, which suggests that their daughter Margaret was one of their first born daughters. Perhaps the first wife of William Bohannon was named Joanna (Anna) or Frances, which would account for the use of those names by John and Helen.

The children of John Bohannon and Helen Cook are listed in an undocumented record.²⁷ Some of them can be identified through an estate administration report in Shelby County dated 06 July 1837.²⁸

William Bohannon (Buckannon) entered 150 acres in Mercer County on Hickory Nut Branch, which was surveyed to him on 20 October 1788. Sometime later, and somehow, he relinquished his claim, because title was granted to Edward Armstrong and heirs on 08 January 1799.²⁹ Hickory Nut Branch was in the north part of Mercer County which became Anderson County in 1827. It is a tributary of the Salt River, downstream from the location of Wilson's Station. The Kentucky River divides Anderson County from Woodford County near here. Shelby County adjoins Anderson County on the north.³⁰ This may have been the father of John Bohannon of Mercer, Woodford and Shelby counties. Perhaps John's father William Bohannon acquired Kentucky land near where John lived and then sold it when he decided to move from Virginia to Tennessee.

Joseph Edrington, who obtained the Mercer County land from John Bohannon, married John's sister Elizabeth Bohannon Cook in Woodford County in 1793. Elizabeth was the widow of Jesse Cook, a brother of Helen Cook Bohannon, who was killed in an Indian raid on 28 April 1792, along with his brother Hosea Cook, who was married to Joseph Edrington's sister, Elizabeth Edrington. The two Betsys, Elizabeth Bohannon Cook and Elizabeth Edrington Cook, are renowned for their heroic defense against the Indians who killed their husbands.³¹ Also among the fatalities from this attack, on a small undefended settlement at Innes Bottom, near Frankfort on South Elkhorn Creek, not far from its junction with North Elkhorn Creek, was a man named Bohannon and his son.³² This Bohannon

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has not been identified further but, despite the elapsed time of four years, he may have been Joseph Bohannon, whose estate inventory was appraised and returned to Mercer County Court, March term, 1796 by Jonathan Colliar, Charles Hart, John Goodnite and Abraham Goodnite:³³

1 hat cover, 1 hat, 1 straight body coat, 3 1/4 yards coating, 1 fiddle, some leather, 1 blanket, 1 pocket handkerchief, 1 rifle gun, 1 saddle, 1 garcoat pattern, a breeches pattern, a pair stockings, jacket, brieches, lagins, old cloaths, a pare shoes and bucles, and a hankerchief.

In any event, neither the man killed with the Cooks nor Joseph Bohannon have been connected with the family of John Bohannon but he or they must have been a cousin or cousins.

Alex Bohannon, who was in Logan's Company with John Bohannon in 1779, may have been the son of Henry Bohannon, Jr. and his first wife Susanna Fretwell. Their son Alexander Bohannon married Mary Hill, with the consent of Joseph Hill, in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, on 20 August 1796.³⁴ Alex Bohannon, who received a North Carolina land grant in Davidson County, Tennessee, in 1783, lived in Sevier County, Tennessee, where he and Mary were members of the Forks of the Little Pigeon Baptist Church from 1807 to 1811. They were on the list of new members in September 1807 as Mary Bohannon and Alleck Bohannon. In March 1808 it was recorded that "it being made appear to the Church that Brother Alexander Bohannon had been guilty of Drinkin two much speritous Liquor, Swearing, and Quarrelling, for which the Church Lays him under censure til our next meating in course." In April 1808 "Brother Bohannon came forward and confest his Sin and sorrows for the same and the Church forgave him." In February 1811, "Brother Alleck Bohannon and his wife requests a letter of creadence which is granted." Perhaps they moved to White County, Tennessee, where the 1820 census included Mary Bohannon, aged 45 or over, with 3 M 18-26, 1 M 16-18 and 3 M 10-16.³⁵

There was another Alex Bohannon (Buchanan) who married Nancy McAfee in Mercer County in 1797 and witnessed the will of Samuel McAfee, Sr., which was proved in Mercer County in August 1801. The heirs were daughters, Anna, Hannah, Polly and Jenny McGoffin, and sons, William, Samuel, John and Robert McAfee.³⁶ Alexander Bohannon (Buchanan) of Mercer County was born about 1769, died on 03 December 1806, aged 37, and is buried in New Providence Presbyterian Cemetery on Providence Pike, one mile west of New Providence Presbyterian Church on US127, near the town of McAfee. His wife Nancy Bohannon (Buchanan) died on 01 October 1810, aged 32, and is buried in the same cemetery. This church was originally built in 1785.³⁷

John Bohannon and Helen Cook were Baptists and members of Forks of Elkhorn Baptist Church in Woodford County. She became a member on 15 January 1791.³⁸

The minutes of the church do not disclose why John Bohannon was excluded from membership but he is mentioned otherwise:

John Bohannon was on the Woodford County tax list in August 1800.³⁹ He was residing in Woodford County when the census was taken in 1810:⁴⁰

In July 1813 John Bohannon was granted the administration of the estate of his son Abraham, who was killed in the War of 1812:⁴¹

John and Helen Cook Bohannon remained in Woodford County through the census of 1820, when their only child still living at home was Henry, aged 20:⁴²

They moved to Shelby County and were living in the area north of the road from Frankfort to Louisville, when the 1830 census was enumerated:⁴³

John Bohannon died on 10 July 1832 without a will. An order to appraise his estate was issued at the August 1832 court for Shelby County:⁴⁶

A settlement with Wm. Bohannon Admor. of John Bohannon decd. with its accompanying vouchers was filed subject to exceptions August Term 1837. No exception being filed to the settlement with Wm. Bohannon Admor. of John Bohannon decd. the same was ordered to be recorded.

Helen Cook Bohannon died in 1837, apparently after the estate of John Bohannon was settled in July, when the records refer to her without indicating that she was dead.

Unless there was another record of distribution to heirs, Margaret, Frances, and Rhoda Bohannon apparently died before their father, without surviving issue. Their inclusion in the family record of John Bohannon and Helen Cook⁴⁸ is not supported by any documentation or other evidence of their existence. Abraham Bohannon and Prudence Jones had a daughter Rhoda Bohannon who married (1) Hercules Agee on 01 February 1821 and (2) Hosea Cook on 14 July 1823 in Shelby County.⁴⁹ Rachel Bohannon Montgomery died before 1819, when her husband Robert married Patsy Whitecotton in Gallatin County, Kentucky. Among the heirs of John Bohannon were her children or their spouses, Samuel Montgomery, William Knox, Paschal Jackson, Hugh Montgomery, William Wood and Josiah Jackman. The heir, John Montgomery, probably was the husband of Elizabeth Bohannon. The Mitchell heirs were the husband and children of Joanna Bohannon Mitchell. Waller L. Brightwell, who married her daughter Permelia Mitchell,⁵⁰ probably was Waller T. Brightwell of the estate settlement.

Katie May Spruhan Garland and Madge Beatrice Spruhan Goodwin, daughters of John Spruhan and Joan America Bohannon (Bohanon), granddaughters of John Bohannon III and Adaline Booth and great-granddaughters of John Bohannon, Jr. and Polly Sacra, were accepted into membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution against the service of John Bohannon.⁵¹ Dated 16 May 1941, the application of Mrs. Goodwin, of Willow, California, stated that John Bohannon and Helen Cook had a daughter Mary who married John Jackson in 1813, and other daughters who married men named Montgomery, Knox, Wood and Mitchell. This is partially wrong and probably was based on the legatees named in the settlement of the estate of John Bohannon, which included William Knox, Paschal Jackson and William Wood. These men were sons-in-law of Robert Montgomery and Rachel Bohannon.⁵²

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JOHN BOHANNON

Robert Montgomery (1762-1823), who married Rachel Bohannon, was a son of Samuel Montgomery and Margaret (or Mary) Nichols of Wythe County, Virginia, who came to Kentucky in 1786. Samuel, who was a son of Robert Montgomery, bought land in 1791 on Dry Run in Woodford County at what is now the village of Jett. He died in 1797. Rachel Bohannon and Robert Montgomery were married in Woodford County by the pioneer Baptist preacher William Hickman on 22 April 1798. Rachel was the second wife of Robert Montgomery, who was married first to Mary Love. In 1808 Robert and Rachel moved to Gallatin County where Rachel died before 1819 when Robert married (3) Patsy Whitecotton and went to Rush County, Indiana, where he died in 1823. He had children by all three wives.

John Montgomery, who married Elizabeth Bohannon, was a son of Robert Montgomery and Mary Love, who was the son of Samuel Montgomery and Margaret Nichols, who was the son of Robert Montgomery, who was the son of William Montgomery, who was the son of James Montgomery who came from Ireland in 1666. John Montgomery and Elizabeth Bohannon were the parents of William Henry Montgomery, who married Mary Elizabeth Hoggins. Their daughter Mary Jane Montgomery married William Henry Bohannon, son of Abraham Bohannon and Mary Lewis.⁵³

Robert C. Montgomery had 2 children by Mary Love and 7 by Rachel Bohannon. John Montgomery had 14 children by Elizabeth Bohannon, including William Montgomery, who married Elizabeth Hoggins, and 7 children by Priscilla Montgomery.⁵⁴ Robert C. Montgomery served in the Revolutionary War and was wounded at the Battle of Guilford Court House, North Carolina.⁵⁵ Born in 1762, Robert would have been 48 in 1810 when the census reported his age as being 45 or over. Rachel Bohannon Montgomery was tabulated as being between 26 and 45 (born between 1765 and 1784). To have married in 1798, she must have been born by 1782, perhaps a year or two earlier. Robert Montgomery and his son-in-law, Robert Montgomery, Jr., were enumerated in Gallatin County on the same page.⁵⁶

When Robert C. Montgomery died in Rush County, Indiana, in 1823, his son John was named as administrator of his estate and as guardian of his orphaned siblings, Frances, Samuel, Eleanor and Sarah Jane Montgomery.⁵⁷

Robert Montgomery, Jr., who married Sally Montgomery, probably was a nephew of Robert Montgomery, known as junior to differentiate him from his uncle. Sally and her husband moved to Gallatin County.

Sally Wilcoxson, who married Hugh Montgomery, was a daughter of Daniel Wilcoxson and Sally Faulconer and a sister of Jane Wilcoxson, who married William Bohannon. It appears that Hugh was married twice. Elizabeth Montgomery, daughter of George Montgomery, married Hugh Montgomery on 14 October 1818.⁵⁸ Hugh Montgomery went to California during the gold rush and died there in 1852.

Elizabeth Bohannon, who married John Montgomery, was a daughter of John and Helen Cook Bohannon and a sister of Robert Montgomery's second wife Rachel. Married to John in 1813, Elizabeth probably was born before 1798. The 1820 census for Gallatin County, Kentucky, shows John Montgomery with a female aged 16-26 (born between 1794 and 1804) and three children who could have been born after 1813.⁵⁹

Frederick Mitchell, who married Joanna Bohannon, was the son of Rosanna Mitchell who settled on Glens Creek near Millville in Woodford County.⁶⁰ Frederick Mitchell was enumerated on the 1810 census for Woodford County with 33-year-old Joanna shown as being between 26 and 45.⁶¹

Eight children of Joanna Bohannon and Frederick Mitchell have been identified, with the names of three spouses.⁶³ Mahala Stucker who married William J. Mitchell was a daughter of Sarah Stucker. There were two other Mitchell-Stucker marriages. Frederick Mitchell had a brother John Mitchell, whose daughter, Rosanna Mitchell, married William Stucker in Woodford County in 1813. Another brother Michael Mitchell had a daughter Sarah Mitchell, who married John Stucker.

Waller and Permelia Mitchell Brightwell went to Platte County, Missouri.⁶⁴

Polly Sacra (Sacry, Sacre), who married John Bohannon, Jr. on 27 December 1810, was a daughter of Isaac Sacra and Elizabeth George, who came to Kentucky from Caroline County, Virginia.⁶⁵ Elizabeth Sacra gave her consent to the marriage.⁶⁶

William Yount married Polly’s sister Catherine Sacra on 24 April 1810. Another sister Elizabeth “Betsy” Sacra married William B. Cook, son of Jesse Cook and Elizabeth Bohannon on 14 February 1811. Their brother Abner Sacra married Phebe Martin Crook, widow of Zachariah Crook, on 05 March 1823, with Henry Bohannon as surety.⁶⁷

Isaac Sacra died in Franklin County, Kentucky, in 1807, and his widow Elizabeth obtained a pension for his service in the Revolutionary War. Elizabeth George Sacra, who was born on 01 March 1761, was a daughter of Robert and Mary George. She married Isaac Sacra on 24 December 1780 and had nine children, who were listed from a Bible record:⁶⁸

appeared before me James Durgin a Justice of the Peace in and for Hendricks County State of Indiana Elizabeth Sacrey a resident of Indiana in the County of Hendricks aged Seventy years seven months and seven days who being first duly sworn according to law doth under Oath make the following declaration in order to Claim the benefit of the pension made by the Act of Congress passed July 7th A.D. 1831 entitled an Act Granting half pay and pensions to certain Widows that she is the Widow of Isaac Sacrey who was a private in the 2nd Virginia Regiment that she had often heard him say that he served in Captain Hawes Company & that the Regiment was Comanded by Col Woodford She further states that she has heard him say that he enlisted as a regular soldier in the County of Caroline State of Virginia about the year A.D. 1777 for two years. That he from thence marched Northward and before the expiration of his enlistment he was taken sick and in the fall of the year preceding the expiration of the time of his enlistment he returned home in the care of his brother James Sacrey in part that he was unable to walk from the time of his return till the next spring & before he was able to render any service the time of his enlistment expired. she further declaims that she was married to the said Isaac Sacrey on the 24th of December in the year 1780 in the County of Caroline State of Virginia and that he died in Franklin County State of Kentucky in the year 1807 that she was not married to him previous to his leaving the service but the marriage took place previous to the first day of January 1794, to wit, at the time above stated as she knows from her own recollection, and also as appears from the original Family Record of their marriage which is now in her possession and reads thus, Elizabeth George born March 1st 1761 married to Isaac Sacrey December 24th 1780, She would further State that she knows of no person by whom she can prove her marriage except James Sacrey and Virgil Poe both of Franklin County, Kentucky She therefore hopes that the Department will allow her claim that a small pension would be of great use to her in her old age. she would further state that she is very infirm and consequently is unable to attend in open Court to make her declaration that she lives five miles from the Court house in her County

On 10 September 1839, a Certificate of Pension was issued to Elizabeth Sacrey, widow of Isaac Sacrey, a private in the Virginia Line, and sent to Henry Bohannon, Christiansburg, Kentucky. She was inscribed on the Roll at the rate of \$70.00 per annum, to commence on 04 March 1843. A second certificate was issued on 24 August 1844 and sent to John Bohannon, Bellville, Indiana.

Isaac Sacra's brother, James C. Sacra, who served with him in the Revolutionary War and was a pensioner, married (1) Nancy Collins, daughter of John Collins of Caroline County, Virginia, before her father deeded her a negro girl on 13 September 1787 in Caroline County, and (2) Joanna Crutcher Sale in Franklin County, Kentucky, on 02 January 1801. Widow Joanna Crutcher Sale was a daughter of Henry and Susanna Crutcher, who came to Woodford County, Kentucky, from Caroline County, Virginia, and a sister of Katherine (Keturah) Crutcher, who married William Cook III. James C. Sacra had two sons and two daughters by his first wife and, at least, one daughter by his second. Two of his daughters married sons of William Cook III and Keturah Crutcher, with their brother John C. Sacra as surety on both bonds. Margaret Sacra married Jesse Cook against a bond issued in Shelby County on 02 September 1818, and Nancy Sacra married Isaac Cook against a bond issued in Franklin County on 05 October 1820.⁶⁹

James Havilah Fenley (Findley), who married Malinda Bohannon on 08 July 1830,⁷⁰ was born in Shelby County, Kentucky, in 1808 and died in Putnam County, Indiana, in 1864 where he is buried in Bell Union Cemetery. Malinda Bohannon Fenley went to Wayne County, Iowa, in 1868 with her children. She is buried there in Confidence Cemetery.⁷¹

Harvey Pilcher, who married America Bohannon, was a son of John Pilcher whose wife was named Moore. By his first wife, whose name is not known, Harvey Pilcher had a son Louis, a daughter Susan and two other daughters. By America Bohannon he had Robert who married Molly Moss, William who married Alice Moss and Charles who married Amanda Burge.⁷²

The female over 45 probably was Polly's mother who was a widow when John and Polly were married in 1810. Perhaps John moved into the Sacra home and was counted as the head of the family in 1820. The persons over 10 could have been siblings of Polly. Her youngest brother Benjamin, who was born on 24 August 1799 and whose marriage date is unknown, would have been 21 in 1820. Brother Abner, who was born on 01 January 1795 and did not get married until 1823, would have been 25. Both could be the males in age group 16-26. When Elizabeth George Sacra applied for her pension in 1838, she resided with her son Abner, so perhaps John and Polly Sacra Bohannon moved to their own farm in the interim.

John Bohannon, Jr. bought 101 acres, 1 rood and 31 1/2 poles of land, on the headwaters of Big Benson Creek in Shelby County, from John and Luvinia Wilcoxson of Shelby County for \$300 in silver on 04 March 1825. The tract was part of 2000 acres surveyed for Samuel Beall and adjoined land of Daniel Wilcoxson, John D. Mitchell, David Lilly and Abraham Bohannon.⁷⁴

Elizabeth Bohannon married Moses Dulin (Dooly) on 24 April 1828⁷⁵ and Malinda Bohannon probably was married after the 1830 census of Shelby County was taken, which listed John and Polly as a family of 11:⁷⁶

Edith Julia Harrison was a daughter of John Wesley Harrison (b. 1822; d. 20 Apr 1870) and Elizabeth Safronia Kirkpatrick (b. 04 Feb 1823; d. 19 Jul 1878), who were married 19 October 1843 at Point Pleasant, Mason County, West Virginia. Elizabeth Safronia Kirkpatrick was a daughter of Thomas Kirkpatrick and Margaret Weir. Her father Thomas Weir was a soldier in the Revolutionary War.

L.B. Bohannon was a school superintendent in Madison, Nebraska.

Margaret Louise Stoll was the daughter of George Henry Stoll and Maria Ysidra "Sadie" Reyes. Sadie Reyes was the daughter of John R. Reyes. George Henry Stoll ran his own business in Los Angeles, California, importing coffee, tea, and spices.

John McClellan Bohannon was one of the earliest residents of Beverly Hills, California, and among other things, was secretary of the Alexandria Hotel in Los Angeles and later owned his own real-estate firm in southern California. He was awarded the Freedom Award, presented by President Harry Truman in Los Angeles in 1948 for his service as "ADM OF CAMP HAAN" and his work in civil defense and for the OPA during World War II.

John Lawrence Bohannon is the grandfather of James. R. Bohannon of Sunnyvale, California. Robert William Bohannon is also still living in May 1998. [E-mail data, James R. Bohannon <james@mingming.com> 20 May1998.]

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Evelyn Campbell, who married Allen Bohannon, was a daughter of Abel E. Campbell and Mary F. Jameson and a native of Illinois.⁹⁴

John Seaton Robinson, who married Kate Bohannon, was the youngest of the thirteen children of Robert Robinson and Sarah Aiken, who were born, respectively, in 1810 and 1817 in Ireland. They were married in 1832 and emigrated to Wheeling, West Virginia, in 1837. John Seaton Robinson was born there on 04 May 1856 and eventually became a lawyer who established a practice in Madison, Nebraska, in May, 1884. He served two terms as County Attorney and was Judge of the District Court before being elected to the U. S. Congress. He and Kate Bohannon had two children, Adeline, who was born in 1894 and John S., Jr, who was born in 1900. Judge Robinson died on 25 May 1903.⁹⁵

When James C. Sacra made his application for a Revolutionary War pension in 1838, he made an affidavit before Henry Bohannon, who was a justice of the peace for Shelby County. When Elizabeth George Sacra applied for her pension, as the widow of Isaac Sacra, she needed family information in the possession of Mary Sacra, widow of her son James George Sacra, in Gallatin County. Henry Bohannon wrote to his brother-in-law John Montgomery, who was a justice of the peace in Gallatin County, where the county seat is Warsaw, on the Ohio River, for assistance and received the following letter with the requested documents. The letter accompanied the paperwork to the Pension Bureau in Washington and is a part of the file:⁹⁷

Gallatin County, May 21st 1839

Bro. Henry, I never received your letter until Satterday last and I went on Sunday to see Mrs. Sacrey and she was not at home and I went again on Monday and found hur at home. I qualified hur and she stated to what you see in the certificate. She never heard hur husband say hoo wrote the old record as she can recollect. I then went on to Warsaw and I don what I had to doo thare and send the papers in the mail boat but she past before I could get ready. I then come on home and will send them to day. As respects our family, we are all in common health. Samuel's family is in tolerable health. His wife is grunting a little, probable in the family way. Polly Wood was heare this morning and she says hur family is well. I hope Bob and Harpers families are both well. Bill Wood does not doo any better that what he youst to doo. Nothing uncommon has taken place in the nighbourhood lately. James Sacrey widow wishes to know where her mother-in-law is. You can write to me and I will let hur know. I wish you to write oftener. Crops look fine in this country. Betsy keeps talking about the 20th Oct. next and I know nothing to prevent her from comeing up according to promise. Nothing more at present, but remain your friend and relative.

William Wood. Samuel, whose wife was pregnant in 1839, probably was John's brother Samuel Montgomery and his first wife Susan Bacon, whom he married in 1836 in Gallatin County. Bob could be his brother Robert Montgomery, Jr.

The date, 20 October 1839, when Betsy Bohannon Montgomery anticipated visiting Shelby County, does not appear to be a significant anniversary in the known vital statistics of the family.

Philadelphia Gale, who married Henry Bohannon, was a daughter of Robert F. Gale and Elizabeth Wood who came from Virginia to Scott County, Kentucky, and then settled in Woodford County, where he had a mill near the mouth of Glenss Creek. Robert F. Gale was born in Caroline County, Virginia, in 1769.⁹⁸ Price Edrington was security on the marriage bond for Henry Bohannon (Buckhannon) and Philadelphia Gale on 28 June 1820.⁹⁹ Philadelphia apparently died after her daughter Letha was born on 21 September 1832 and before 13 February 1833 when Henry Bohannon married (2) Laura (Lora) Gale, ancestor of Laurel Winter Botts, Jr., who was accepted into membership by the Sons of the American Revolution on 25 July 1972 as a descendant of John Bohannon, through his son Henry Bohannon. Laurel W. Botts, Sr. was a son of Dr. William Harvey Botts, who was born on 21 December 1829 in Greencastle, Indiana, and died on 15 May 1907 in Shelby County, Kentucky, and Elizabeth Bohannon, who was born on 18 July 1836 in Shelby County, Kentucky, and died there on 20 May 1852. They are buried in Bagdad Cemetery. In addition to these vital statistics, his application also contained the birth and death dates of Laura Gale (Gail), second wife of Henry Bohannon, for whom a marriage date of 13 February 1833 in Shelby County, Kentucky, was given without source documentation. This indicates that Laura was the mother of the children of Henry T. Bohannon, beginning with Elizabeth.¹⁰⁰ William H. Botts and Elizabeth Bohannon were

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married on 20 May 1852, against a bond secured by her father Henry Bohannon.¹⁰¹

Harvey Bohannon was described as the fourth son of Henry Bohannon and Philadelphia Gale.¹⁰² Harvey Bohannon (03 Nov 1829-22 Feb 1904), Cynthia Ann Gale Bohannon, His Wife (28 Dec 1843-03 Jun 1902), and Lewellyn Bohannon, Son of H. & C. A. Bohannon, Aged 7 Mos. (16 Jul 1876), are buried in Bagdad Cemetery, Shelby County, Kentucky.¹⁰³

One of the three sons which were born to Henry Bohannon and Philadelphia Gale before Harvey was Samuel G. Bohannon, who must have been named for her grandfather Samuel Gale. Samuel G. Bohannon married Rebecca Jane Miles, daughter of James, on 23 May 1844.¹⁰⁴ Samuel died before 14 August 1849 when his widow married Daniel Cook.¹⁰⁵ Daniel Cook was a son and heir of Seth Cook by his second wife, who has been identified as Lydia "Ann" Guthrie.¹⁰⁶ Daniel and Rebecca Jane Miles Bohannon Cook were enumerated on the Shelby County census on 03 October 1850, with her son by Samuel G. Bohannon:¹⁰⁷

Another of the sons preceding Harvey was William Bohannon, who died in Shelby County on 24 December 1852. He was identified as a son of Henry and Delphi Bohannon.¹⁰⁸ This undoubtedly was the William Bohannon who married Eliza Lewis, with the consent of her guardian Elliott Bondurant, on 23 May 1844. The rites were performed by the Baptist preacher Abraham Cook. Samuel G. Bohannon was married on the same day, probably in a double ceremony.¹⁰⁹ When William died intestate, his father Henry Bohannon was appointed as administrator of his estate. On a motion by Henry, the Shelby County Court ordered Elliott Bondurant and George W. Bondurant to appraise it and the appraisal was returned on 21 January 1853, with a total value of \$194.00. A sale of the estate brought \$221.65 5/6. The list of purchasers included Harvey Bohannon, Jeffrey Christie, William Bohannon, Elliott Bondurant, George W. Bondurant, Abraham Bohannon, Hiram Bohannon, Lewis Wilcoxson, Malinda Scrogin (Scoggen), Jack Bohannon, Rebecca Maddox, Squire Wade, Robert Bondurant, John Radford and R. T. Sacra.¹¹⁰

Elliott Bondurant was a son of Benjamin Bondurant and Elizabeth Bohannon, natives of Virginia who were married in Woodford County, Kentucky, in 1806. Born on 31 October 1807 in Woodford County, Elliott married Melissa Gale on 22 April 1830 in Shelby County.¹¹¹ Elliott Bondurant (1807-1897) is buried in Bagdad Cemetery.¹¹² Benjamin Bondurant was born on 15 February 1781 and died on 27 May 1836. Elizabeth Bohannon Bondurant died on 12 October 18--, aged 52.¹¹³ Elizabeth was born on 21 January 1782, so she died in 1834. She was a daughter of Elliott Bohannon, Jr. (c1743-1824), who came to Woodford County from Culpeper County, Virginia. Elliott, Jr. was a son of Elliott Bohannon (1711-1781) of Culpeper County and his wife Ann Walker. Elliott, Sr. was a son of Robert and Bathsheba Bohannon. Robert was a son of Duncan Bohannon, Jr. and his wife Sarah, whose maiden name may have been Elliott.¹¹⁴ John Bohannon of Shelby County connects with this family at their common ancestor, immigrant Duncan Bohannon, Sr.

It is likely that one of the sons born before Harvey Bohannon would have been named John, since it was traditional to name a first born son for one's father. Jack Bohannon, who purchased something from the estate of William Bohannon, may have been the eldest son of Henry and Philadelphia.

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Younger children of Henry Bohannon, by his second wife Laura Gale, appear on the census for Shelby County taken on 03 October 1850:¹¹⁵

Daughter E. Bohannon was Elizabeth Bohannon, sister of Hiram and Harvey Bohannon, who married Dr. William Harvey Botts. Elizabeth Bohannon, daughter of Henry Bohannon, who was surety on the marriage bond, and William H. Botts were married on 20 May 1852.¹¹⁶ They were enumerated on the 1880 census in the Christiansburg District of Shelby County:¹¹⁷

William H. Botts, Jr., son of Dr. William Harvey Botts, who was the leading physician in Bagdad from 1880 until his death in the early 1900's, and Elizabeth Bohannon, married Nannie Belle Kesler, daughter of Thomas D. Kesler and Rachel Miles. Nannie Belle Kesler was a sister of Walter James Kesler who married Myrtle Forrest Scrogins, daughter of William Samuel Scrogins and Mary Edna Wade, granddaughter of Benjamin Scrogin and Pamela Bohannon and great-granddaughter of William Bohannon and Jane Wilcoxson. W. H. Botts, Jr. and Nannie Belle Kesler had a son Tom Botts.¹¹⁸ The Botts are interred in the Bagdad Cemetery:¹¹⁹

H. T. Bohannon was credited with real estate valued at \$10500 and personal property worth \$5850. John Bohannon, aged 14, was shown with personal estate valued at \$1100, so he must not have been a son of Henry T. Bohannon. He may have been a son of William Bohannon who died in 1852.

Henry G. Bohannon, who married Jane Catherine Scrogin on 26 April 1866, with Harvey Bohannon as his bondsman, must have been the son of Henry T. Bohannon.¹²¹ Jane Catherine was a daughter of Benjamin Scrogin and Pamela Bohannon, daughter of William Bohannon and Jane Wilcoxson.¹²²

Hiram Bohannon (1846-1912) and Amanda E Bohannon (1844-1912) are buried in the Bagdad Cemetery, Bagdad, Kentucky.¹²³ Their daughter Jennie Bohannon (23 May 1878-27 Oct 1893) is also interred there.¹²⁴

Elliott Bohannon, son of Henry, married Nancy Scrogin, daughter of Samuel Scrogin, on 17 December 1755.¹²⁵ Malinda Scrogin who bought something from the estate of William Bohannon was the mother of Nancy Scrogin Bohannon.¹²⁶ The name Elliott may have come into use in this family from the association with Elliott Bondurant.

Jeffrey B. Christie, another purchaser, who married Letha Bohannon on 08 July 1844, was a son of Israel Christie and Elizabeth Cook. Born on 21 September 1832, Letha married (2) William Vardeman, son of Thomas and Mary Wilcoxson Vardeman, and (3) Richard Day on 22 December 1898. She died on 04 April 1917.¹²⁷ Letha undoubtedly was named for her aunt Letha Gale, sister of Philadelphia, who married Richard Radford of Shelby County in Woodford County in 1828.¹²⁸

Elizabeth Cook Christie was a daughter of Abraham Cook and Sarah Jones.¹²⁹

Mary Wilcoxson, who married Thomas Vardeman, was a sister of Jane Wilcoxson who married William Bohannon. William Vardeman, who was born in Kentucky in 1813, was a widower when he

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married Letha Bohannon Christie, but the name of his first wife is not known. His brother Peter Vardeman married Mary Scrogin, sister of Benjamin Scrogin who married Pamela Bohannon, and of Samuel Scrogin who married Malinda Miles and had Cynthia Ann Scrogin who married Harvey Bohannon.¹³⁰

The biography of Dr. J. G. Bohannon of Muhlenberg County, Kentucky, identified his parents Harvey Bohannon and Cynthia Ann Scrogin (Scroggin) as of Scotch descent. Harvey Bohannon was described as a farmer and surveyor and his father Henry Bohannon was reported to have been a farmer, surveyor, justice and sheriff in Shelby County, Kentucky. In his latter years, Henry Bohannon was Secretary and Treasurer of Georgetown College in Georgetown, Kentucky. Dr. Bohannon, who was born in Shelby County in 1852, believed that his grandfather Henry Bohannon was born in Maryland, which is incorrect. Henry Bohannon was born in Kentucky and his father was a native of Virginia. Perhaps the tradition, that the family came to Kentucky from Maryland, was based on the Maryland origins of the Scrogin family, of which Dr. Bohannon was not fully informed. He stated that his maternal grandfather Samuel Scroggin was a farmer and "an early settler of Kentucky," when Samuel actually was born in Kentucky in 1810. Samuel Scrogin's father John Scrogin was born in Sussex County, Delaware, and came with his father Samuel Scrogin, who was born in Maryland in 1749, to Kentucky in 1794.¹³¹ Dr. Bohannon also identified the Scrogin family as of Scotch descent and described his maternal grandmother Malinda Miles Scrogin as of English extraction. Other Miles family genealogists consider the family to be of Welsh origin. Dr. Bohannon married A. M. Haden, daughter of G. W. Haden and Lucy Slaughter, in 1879. They had two sons, George Harvey Bohannon and Joseph Haden Bohannon.¹³² G. W. Haden, father of Amanda M. Haden Bohannon, was born on 06 December 1813 in Maryland.¹³³

Henry Bohannon was security on the marriage bond of James Bohannon and Elizabeth Sacra (Sacry), daughter of Abner Sacra, who were wed on 22 August 1850.¹³⁴ James, who was born about 1828, does not appear to have been a grandson of John Bohannon and Helen Cook, so he must have been a grandson of Abraham Bohannon and Prudence Jones. However he was counted on the 1860 census for Shelby County next door to Matthew Hazlett and Mary Jane Bohannon and one house away from William Bohannon and Jane Wilcoxson.¹³⁵

Samuel Marion married Sarah J. Bohannon, daughter of Abraham Bohannon, who was bondsman, on 08 October 1868.¹³⁶ Abraham Bohannon probably was the son of William Bohannon and Jane Wilcoxson because Samuel Marion was surety on the marriage bond for John A. Horn and Rebecca H. Bohannon on 02 March 1869. Rebecca was the granddaughter of William and Jane Bohannon, by their son Abraham and his wife Polly.¹³⁷

Mary Jane Bohannon, who married Matthew Hazlett, was a daughter of William and Jane Wilcoxson Bohannon.

Elizabeth Sacra Bohannon was a daughter of Abner Sacra and Phebe Martin Crook, widow of

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Zachariah Crook, who were married 05 March 1823 in Shelby County, with Henry Bohannon as bondsman.¹³⁸

Abraham Bohannon, who apparently never married or had children, was killed during the War of 1812, when he served as a private in Captain Virgil McCracken's Company of Riflemen, 1st Rifle Regiment of the Kentucky Volunteer Militia, from 15 August 1812 until 05 March 1813. The company muster roll for the period 01 December 1812 to 05 March 1813 shows him as missing. His name is spelled Buckhannon on all company rosters, except on a special muster roll for the same period listing the names of persons taken prisoner at the Battle of River Raisin on 22 January 1813, where it is spelled Bohannon.¹³⁹ Abraham Bohannon probably was murdered by the Indians in the prisoner massacre that followed the battle. The expedition to Frenchtown on River Raisin began at Fort Defiance. Directed by William Henry Harrison, the 900 Americans, mostly Kentuckians, were led by Brigadier General James Winchester against 1100 British and Indians in this first engagement of the Northwest Campaign of 1813. In the order of battle on 22 January 1813, the troops of the 1st Regiment, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel John Allen, were on the right wing. A company of men from Franklin County, under Captain Paschal Hickman, son of the noted pioneer Baptist preacher William Hickman, was placed in advance of the Americans with another company. 73 of the 86 Franklin County men were killed in the defeat of the Americans and in the subsequent prisoner massacre, including Captain Hickman. On the day after the battle, the British commander Colonel Henry Proctor permitted the Indians to slaughter the wounded and captured Americans. Hickman, whose legs were so badly mangled from battle wounds that they were amputated after his capture by the British and Indians, was dragged outside of the building where the captives were kept, his skull crushed by tomahawk blows and his body thrown back into the house. Many of the prisoners were hacked to death by tomahawk, as was Captain Hickman, some were shot and others burned at the stake. The bodies of the dead soldiers were left unburied and they were eaten by animals. Months later, when Governor Isaac Shelby of Kentucky arranged for burial of the bones, only 65 skeletons could be accounted for. Eventually these remains were returned to Kentucky and interred at Frankfort. Some must have escaped the butchery, since the details of the massacre are so descriptive. The atrocities at the River Raisin, and later ones at Fort Meigs, steeled the determination of the Kentuckians to defeat the British and Indians, resulting in the final American victory at the Battle of River Thames in Ontario, Canada, in October 1813.¹⁴⁰

Frenchtown is now Monroe, Michigan. It was called Frenchtown because the some 200 inhabitants at the time of the battle were of French nationality. Due to the abundance of grapes which grew along the banks of the stream, upon which the town was situated, the French named the watercourse La Riviere aux Raisins.

In addition to Abraham Bohannon, the roll of Captain McCracken's Company also includes Seth Cook, Robert Scroggins, John Scroggins and Abraham Kesler (Resler), all privates who served from 12 August 1812 to 14 October 1812. This record does not refer to service beyond 14 October 1812, nor to participation in the Battle of the River Raisin on 22 January 1813 in which Captain McCracken

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was killed and Abraham Bohannon was captured and apparently murdered.

Administration of the estate of Abraham Bohannon was granted to John Bohannon in Woodford County, Kentucky, in July 1813.¹⁴¹

JOHN BOHANNON

A biography of Harvey Bohannon describes his grandfather John Bohannon as a native of Maryland, which is an important clue to the ancestry of the family. John Bohannon knew that he was born in Virginia but this tradition indicates that he spoke of the family having lived in Maryland which somehow became misunderstood in oral history. The belief indicates a direct hereditary link to Duncan Bohannon, who settled in Maryland when he arrived in America. *Kentucky: A History of the State*, Battle, Perrin, & Kniffin, 6th ed., 1887, Shelby County.

Harvey Bohannon was born in Shelby County November 3, 1829, the fourth son of Henry and Philadelphia (Gale) Bohannon. Henry was born in Woodford County, a son of John (a native of Maryland) and Helen (Cook) Bohannon. He was county commissioner of the circuit court, or, in other words, master in chancery; was sheriff two years, magistrate several years, represented the county in the Legislature one term, and was also deputy county surveyor. His wife was born in Woodford County, daughter of Robert F. and Elizabeth (Wood) Gale, both natives of Virginia. Robert F. Gale was a soldier in the Revolutionary war. By trade he was a saw mill man, also built flatboats, which his brother would load with produce and take to New Orleans. He died in 1847. Harvey Bohannon has always been engaged in farming. He was county surveyor for twelve years and does more or less surveying still. He is also engaged in the saw mill business on a small scale. May 31, 1849 he married Scynthia Scroggin, of Shelby County, a daughter of Sam and Malinda (Miles) Scroggin. Three children were born to their union, one of whom is living, J. G., who is located at Greenville, Ky., engaged in the practice of medicine. He is married to Manday M. Hoyden, and has three children: George H., Joe H. and Grace. Our subject's first wife died in 1872, and October 31, 1873, he married Scynthia Gale, of Shelby County, daughter of J. W. and Mary A. (Crook) Gale. Two children blessed this union--one living, Harvey Jr.

The name of Dr. J. G. Bohannon's wife, "Manday M. Hoyden" appears as Amanda M. Haden in Dr. Bohannon's biography.

Henry Partlow Montgomery, of Georgetown was born in Gallatin county, Kentucky, on the 8th of February, 1839. His ancestral history is one of close identification with Virginia and Kentucky, and shows an honorable connection of many of the members of the family with the events which secured to America her independence and resulted in the development of Kentucky. The grandfather, Robert Montgomery, was one of the heroes of the Revolution, and was wounded at the battle of Guilford Court House, but eventually recovered from his injuries; in 1785 he removed to Kentucky. The father, John Montgomery was born in Woodford county, this State, and became a successful farmer. He married Elizabeth Bohannon, also a native of Woodford county and a daughter of John Bohannon, who devoted his attention to agricultural pursuits and was descended from Virginian ancestry who established homes in Kentucky in 1786.

Henry P. Montgomery is therefore a representative of two of the old families of the State, and his honorable career has added new luster to the family name. Of America is the self-made man a product, and the record of accomplishments in this individual sense is the record which the true and loyal American holds in deepest regard and highest honor. In tracing the career of the subject of this review we are enabled to gain a recognition of this sort of record, for he has devoted his life to a calling where wealth or family cannot avail one in striving for success. The lawyer must depend upon the broadest intellectuality, unfaltering application and ready adaptability, and with these attributes he

may attain to distinguished honors. Mr. Montgomery was prepared for his professional career by a broad education. He attended Center College, at Danville, Kentucky, and graduated in June, 1860 with the second honors in a class of thirty-five, which included in its membership Rev. E. O. Guerrant, now a prominent Presbyterian minister of Kentucky; Edward Marvin, a leading Presbyterian divine of New York, and Hon. Edward Warring, member of Congress from Kentucky.

Mr. Montgomery read law under the preceptorship of H. J. Atbett, of Warsaw, Kentucky, and was admitted to the bar in Gallatin county in 1860. He began practice in Shelby county, where he remained until January, 1862, when he removed to Owenton, and was an active and influential member of that bar until September, 1882. At that time he came to Georgetown where he now enjoys a large law practice. In Owen county he was elected County Attorney, serving for seven consecutive years from 1863. He was also school Commissioner for four years. He has held the office of special Judge of the Circuit Court by appointment, but has never been an office seeker, preferring to devote his entire attention to his professional duties. In politics he is a strong prohibition.

Mr. Montgomery engages in general law practice, but confines his attention mostly to civil cases. He has been connected with some of the most important litigation that has been heard in this section of the State; was associate council [sic] for the defense in the noted case of the Commonwealth versus Thomas Buford, who was tried for the murder of Judge John M. Elliott, of the Court of Appeals, a case attracting a widespread attention. He is most careful and pain-taking in the preparation of his cases, and then, in the court room, rests his cause on a plain statement of facts and the justice of our laws. He loses sight of no point that will advance the interest of his client, and is a forceful and earnest speaker. He has also been closely identified with the growth and best interests of the city, and has done much to promote its progress and substantial growth. He has been President and attorney of the First National Bank of Georgetown since its organization in 1883; was President of the Water Supply Company, supplying water and electric light to the city, and gives an active support to all measures calculated to promote the educational, social, moral or material welfare of the community.

Mr. Montgomery has been twice married. He first wedded Miss Nannie E. Kenney, of Owen county, a daughter of Richard Kenney. Their marriage was celebrated in 1864, and she died in 1887, leaving three children - Harry, Bessie, wife of John H. Cooper, and Stair. In 1889 he was again married, his second union being with Mrs. Alice P. Mundy, daughter of Hon. A. P. Grover, a member of Congress from 1867 to 1869 from the Louisville district. He finds his chief and most abiding source of enjoyment in his home life. In the pleasures that have their root in family affection, he spends the hours spared from professional duties, and in the home circle he finds the needed rest and relaxation from the stress and strain of public life. He was formerly a member of the Odd Fellows society, and is a member of the Missionary Baptist Church.

John Bohannon and Polly Sacra probably were the parents of Catherine Bohannon, who was born about 1831 in Indiana and married Jephtha Rodgers in December 1848 in Franklin County, Kentucky:
