The father of Henry Bohannon apparently was either John Bohannon or Joseph Bohannon who were on the quit rents list for Kingston Parish, Gloucester County, Virginia, in 1704.¹

The Bohannons of Middlesex County, Virginia, are connected to the Bohannons of Gloucester County, Virginia, by the will of Henry Bohannon of Middlesex County in which he identified himself as a resident of Colonel Armistead's Quarter. The Gloucester County lands of the immigrant settler Duncan Bohannon, Sr. adjoined the lands of the Armistead family. Duncan Bohannon and John Mechen received a patent on 20 December 1667 for 220 acres of land in Gloucester County at the head of the easternmost river in Mobjack Bay adjoining lands of Mr. Armistead and Captain Dudley. The patent was granted against the headrights for transporting four persons to the colony:²

Dunkin Bohono (Bohonno) & Jno. Mechen, 220 acs. Gloster Co., upon the head of the E. most Riv., in Mockjack Bay; 20 Dec. 1667, p. 102. Adj. lands of Mr. Armestead & Capt. Dudley. Trans. of 4 pers: Tho. Arnis (or Amis), John Blan, Roger Shackelford, John Thomas.

Duncan Bohannon (Dunkin Bohonno) and John Mechen (Mekin) assigned this tract to Lieutenant Colonel John Armistead (Armestead) who finally obtained a patent for it on 21 September 1678.³

Duncan Bohannon (Sr.) and John Neville had adjoining land in Gloucester County, Virginia, in 1675:⁴

Jno. Nevill, infant, 100 acs. Gloster Co., Kingston Par., 6 Mar. 1674/5, p. 549. Adj. Dunkin Bohannon on W. side of the E'most river & adj. lands of Richd. Cary & Mr. Jno. Armestead. Due sd. Bohannon by purchase from Mr. Armestead & due sd. Nevel as sonne & heire of his decd. father.

If Duncan Bohannon divided his 340 acres between three sons, the dividends would be 113 1/3 acres each which supports an assumption that the three Bohannon tax payers in Kingston Parish, Gloucester County, in 1704 were his sons:⁵

Bohannah, Duncan 113 1/2 acres
Bohannah, John 113 1/2 acres
Bohannah, Joseph 148 acres

Joseph apparently added to his dividend or perhaps it was surveyed to be a little larger than the other tracts.

John, Joseph and Duncan were sons of Duncan Bohannon and Cicely Collmore who were married in St. Michael Parish, Barbados, on 05 July 1658. Son John was baptized there on 30 January 1658/9.⁶

The land of Duncan Bohannon was on East River in what is now Mathews County. Mobjack Bay is embraced by Gloucester and Mathews counties as an inlet of Chesapeake Bay. It is fed by Severn, North and East rivers. East River is in Mathews County which was formed from Gloucester County in 1790. King and Queen County is adjacent to Middlesex County which adjoins Gloucester County. Gloucester County was formed from York County in 1651. New Kent County was erected from York County in 1654. King and Queen County was established in 1691 from New Kent County. Lancaster County was created in 1651 from Northumberland County and Middlesex County was organized in 1669 from Lancaster. Westmoreland County derived from Northumberland in 1653, part of which became Stafford County in 1664. Prince William County came from Stafford in 1731. Fauquier County originated in 1759 from Prince William. Rappahannock County was founded from Lancaster County in 1656 and expired in 1692 when it was split into Essex and Richmond counties. Spotsylvania County arose from Essex in 1721 and gave birth to Orange County in 1734. In 1749 Culpeper County was structured from Orange.⁷

The records of Christ Church Parish, Middlesex County, contain references to the family:⁸

Joseph Bohannon, the surviving brother of Henry Bohannon who died on 28 July 1740 in Middlesex County, could not be Joseph Bohannon who married Elizabeth Neville because he died before 26 February 1738/9 in Prince William County, Virginia.⁹ One of them must have been a son of Joseph Bohannon who resided in Gloucester County, in 1704 and the other must have been a son of John Bohannon of Gloucester County in 1704. The children of Duncan Bohannon, Jr. who also lived in Gloucester County in 1704, are known and did not include either Henry who died in Middlesex County or Joseph who died in Prince William County. John Bohannon who married Agnes Newberry probably was not a brother of Henry either, since he was not named as an executor nor was he appointed as a substitute for Joseph and George when they refused to serve as executors of Henry's will. This suggests that John who married Agnes Newberry was a brother of Joseph who died in Prince William County.

Duncan Bohannon, Jr. of the 1704 quit rents list apparently moved to St. Stephens Parish, King and Queen County, Virginia, by 1730.¹⁰ He seems to be the Duncan Bohannon with wife Sarah that founded the branch of the Bohannon family that lived in Culpeper County, Virginia, and Woodford County, Kentucky.¹¹

The parents of Joseph Bohannon (Bohanon, Bohanan, Buchanan) of Middlesex and Prince William counties, Virginia, have not been proved but he probably was a son of either John or Joseph Bohannon who resided in Gloucester County, Virginia, in 1704.¹² Elizabeth Neville was a daughter of John Neville and Elizabeth Bohannon.¹³

The surviving sons of Joseph Bohannon and Elizabeth Neville of Hamilton Parish, Prince William County, are named in his will dated 23 November 1738 and proved on 26 February 1738/9.¹⁴ The birth dates of four of their children are among the baptismal records of Christ Church Parish, Middlesex County, Virginia:¹⁵

John Bohannon and Elizabeth Neville, who was born in 1691, had a son John Bohannon (Buchanan), who was born in 1720 and died in 1793. The maiden name of his wife Elizabeth probably was Haynie since they named a son William Haynie Bohannon (Buchanan). He was born in 1752, married Frances Stribling and died in 1820.¹⁶ It is not known whether Joseph Bohannon was born before John or not, but it seems likely that he was born about 1722. In their father's will John is named first, followed by Joseph and the others.

Joseph Bohannon and Elizabeth Neville probably moved to Prince William County shortly after the birth of their son William in 1730. On 03 June 1730, George Neville (Neavil) obtained a warrant for 275 acres of land in Prince William County that was surveyed for him on 31 August 1730. It adjoined the Kettle Run tract of Colonel Carter and lands of William Hackney, Colonel Page, Baldwin and Mr. Debut. George Neville was assignee of William Owen for 181 acres in Prince William County on the South Fork of Bull Run, Catlet's Branch, Bull Run Mountain, drains of Broad Run and the north end of Mother Leather Coat Mountain. The tract had been warranted to Owen on 12 July 1739 and surveyed on 06 March 1739/40. It adjoined land of John Glasscock. On 31 October 1743 George Neville (Neavil) had 183 acres in Prince William County surveyed for him. The tract was on Mother Leather Coat Mountain on Catlet's Branch and adjoined his own land. The land on Broad Run and Mother Leather Coat Mountain fell into Fauquier County when it was formed from Prince William County in 1759. A warrant for land in that location, dated 25 February 1764, which was surveyed on 12 March 1770 for Mr. Yelverton Peyton, adjoined land of Solomon Jones which had been taken up by Captain Neville.¹⁷

Joseph Bohannon resided in Hamilton Parish, Prince William County, Virginia, when he made his will in 1738:¹⁸

In the name of God Amen I Joseph Buchanan of Prince Wm County and parish of Hamilton being sick and weak in body of sound and perfect sence and memory blessed be God for the same Imprimis I comitt my Soul unto the hands of God that gave it me my body I committ to the Earth to be buried in decent and Christian like manner at the discretion of my Exors hereafter named hoping thro the meretorious death and passion of my blessed Lord and Saviour to receive full & free pardon of all my sins Imprimis after my debts are paid and my funeral charges also I bequeath as follows Item I give devise and bequeath to my loving wife Elizabeth Buchanan all my Estate both real and personal during her natural life or widdowhood and after that my moveables to be equally divided amongst my children my land to be equally divided amongst my sons (vizt) John Buchanan Joseph Buchanan Neavill Buchanan Wm Buchanan George Buchanan all to be distributed by my loving wife as aforesd whom I make and ordain as my whole and sole Executrix together with my loving brothers Georg Neavill and Joseph Minter my Executors and I hereby declare this to be my last will and testament making void hereby all other wills and testaments by me heretofore made In testimony whereof I have hereunto sett my hand and affixed my seale this 23d day of November 1738

The probate date of 26 February 1738 for a will written on 23 November 1738 is correct under the calendar of the time, when the year began and ended in March.

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The identification of George Neville and Joseph Minter as “brothers” must be interpreted to mean “brothers-in-law.” The wife of Joseph Minter apparently was a sister of Joseph Bohannon since she does not appear in family records as a sister of Elizabeth Neville Bohannon.¹⁹ Her name was Mary.²⁰

Elizabeth Bohannon returned an inventory of the estate of Joseph Bohannon to Prince William County Court on 28 May 1739 and submitted an additional one on 27 August 1739. Elizabeth Bohannon married (2) Thomas Faulkner of Fairfax County, Virginia, before 25 November 1745 when Thomas Faulkner and his wife Elizabeth of Fairfax County made a deed of gift to “our loving sons Neavill & William Buchanan of Prince William County.”²¹

On 05 December 1745 John Bohannon of Dettingen Parish, Prince William County, bought 100 acres on Bull Run from Robert Taylor which was a tract granted to Thomas Davies and sold by him to Taylor. On 25 November 1751 Thomas Faulkner, Neville Bohannon and William Bohannon of Dettingen Parish, Prince William County, sold 373 acres in Hamilton Parish to Thomas Dodson that was a tract granted to Charles Taylor and sold by him to John Minter and sold by Minter to Elizabeth Bohannon. The deed was witnessed by Robert Foster, John Neville and Robert Neville. Elizabeth Bohannon Faulkner did not participate in the deed or relinquish her dower right, probably because she had done so when she conveyed the land to her sons. On 24 August 1752 Joseph Bohannon and his wife Sarah, who relinquished her dower right, acknowledged their indenture of lease and release to John Bohannon in Prince William County Court. On the same day William Bohannon acknowledged his indenture of lease and release to John Bohannon, without a wife to relinquish her dower rights. On 29 March 1764 John Bohannon (Buchanan) and wife Elizabeth sold the 100 acres that he bought from Robert Taylor to John Hooe. The deed was witnessed by William Bohannon (Buchanan), T. Blackburn, Houson Hooe and John Kincheloe. William Bohannon probably was the brother of John Bohannon because John Bohannon's son William Haynie Bohannon was not born until 1752.²²

Thomas Faulkner, his wife Elizabeth Faulkner and John Bohannon appeared in Prince William County Court as witnesses for Joseph Bohannon and his wife Sarah, who were being sued by Thomas Davis, and were awarded compensation by the Court on 23 June 1752 for attending Court for five days at the rate of 125 pounds of tobacco each, to be paid by Joseph.²³ Elizabeth Neville Bohannon Faulkner was still alive on 13 December 1774 when she participated in a deed as the widow of Thomas Faulkner, deceased. She was one of the executors of his will on 04 September 1774.²⁴

Despite the continuity of the Bohannon and Neville families in southwestern Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky, William Bohannon, who died in Henry County, Tennessee, apparently was not the son of Joseph Bohannon and Elizabeth Neville, who seems to have stayed in the area of Prince William County where land records indicate that branch of the family entrenched itself.²⁵

Elizabeth Bohannon (Buchanan) was granted 193 acres on South Run in Prince William County, adjoining land of DeButt, by a warrant dated 15 November 1742. The tract was bought from Charles Taylor, deceased, by John Minter, who sold it to Elizabeth Bohannon. It was surveyed on 04 March 1742/3 by Thomas Davies.

John Bohannon (Buckhannan) was a chain carrier for John Warner when he surveyed two

tracts of land in Prince William County for Thomas Davies on 18 and 19 February 1739/40. The first tract of 133 acres was on branches of Bull Run and Buckhall Branch, adjacent to lands of Richard Melton, Nathaniel Harris, George Reeves, Howson (Howsin) Hooe and William Davis. Owen Owens also was a chain carrier and the pilot was William Melton. The second parcel of 257 acres was on branches of Bull Run and a branch called The Log House, adjoining Colonel Carter, Thomas Osborn (Osborn), William Davies (Davis), John Creel, Nathaniel Russel and Major Champ. Owen Owens and John Frost also were chain carriers.

John Neville (Neavill) was pilot and George Neville (Neavill) was a chain carrier for John Genn when he surveyed land on Cedar Run and Walnut Branch in Prince William County for Timothy Dorgan on 14 April 1743.

John Bohannon (Buchanan) had land on Rushey Branch of Bull Run which adjoined 138 acres that was warranted to Captain Daniel Kincheloe on 19 April 1770. William Bohannon (Buchanan) was a chain carrier when it was surveyed by John Moffett on 27 September 1770. The tract also adjoined lands of Cornelius Kincheloe, Howson Hooe, John Hooe and Isaac Davis. Jesse Davis also was a chain carrier.

Mr. George Neville (Neavill), Jr. had a warrant for 270 acres in Fauquier County on Cedar Run dated 29 December 1762, which was surveyed on 21 January 1763. Joseph Neville (Neavill) had land on Cedar Run in Fauquier County that was adjacent to land of Richard Taylor, assignee of William Hampton, who was assignee of Mr. Richard Hampton. The land had been surveyed, with the consent of Mr. George Neville (Neavill), Jr., in April 1764.

Joseph Neville (Nevel), Jr. was a chain carrier on a survey on 07 April 1755 of land that fell into Fauquier County.

George Neville (Nevill) had land in Frederick County, Virginia, which was adjacent to a tract warranted to John Lindsey on 02 November 1750.²⁶ This suggests that the Bohannons (Buchanans) of the Shenandoah Valley might have been a branch of the family of Joseph Bohannon and Elizabeth Neville. They also may have come into the Valley from Pennsylvania, through western Maryland.

William Bohannon, the chain carrier in 1770 could have been the son of Joseph Bohannon and Elizabeth Neville, or he could have been one of their grandsons. Son William Bohannon lived in Loudoun County, Virginia, in 1787 and had a son Spencer Bohannon.²⁷

John Bohannon (Buckanan) died in Frederick County on 10 April 1787 and an inventory of his estate was dated 01 December 1787. He may have been married to Ann Hite, daughter of Isaac Hite of Frederick County, whose will was dated 04 July 1794 and proved on 06 October 1795. His heirs were children Isaac Hite, Ann Bohannon (Bucknana), Rebecca Booth and Sarah Clark; and grandchildren Isaac Hite Williams, John Williams and Eleanor Long. His executors were son Isaac Hite and sons-in-law William A. Booth and Jonathan Clark. Eleanor, the wife of Isaac Hite died before him. She and Ann Bohannon (Buckhannon) were legatees of Isaac Hite's sister Mary McDonald, whose will was dated 18 August 1788 and proved in April 1789. The heirs of Mary McDonald were Ann Buckhannon; Rebecca Booth; Sarah Clark; niece Eleanor Ellinge Williams; mother Eleanor Hite, sister-in-law Eleanor Hite, wife of brother Isaac Hite; niece Mary McDonald; niece Sophia Brent, daughter of Archibald McDowell; Mrs. Ann Gibbs whose late husband was John McDonald; brother-in-law Angus

McDonald of the Island of St. John and his four sisters; sister Rebecca Booth; and children of late sister Eleanor. Brother Isaac Hite was named as executor.²⁸

Frederick County was established from Orange County in 1743, which suggests that John was connected with the Bohannon family of Orange County. Isaac Hite, Sr., who was in Kentucky with William Bohannon in 1775, was a son of Hans Jost Heydt (Yost Hite) and Anna Maria Du Bois. His mother was a relative of Sarah Du Bois who married Joost Jans van Meteren, so she was related to their son Jans Joost van Meteren (John Van Meter) and through him to the Jones, Cook, Bohannon, Wade, Pusey and Turman families.²⁹
